- **7.** Final concert involving schools, adults from the project workshop and other local singers and musicians

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






Celebrating East Anglian folksong

A day of illustrated talks and an afternoon concert telling the story of composer Ralph Vaughan Williams' trips to the eastern counties a hundred years ago to collect folk-songs from fishermen and farmworkers.



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Talks include. That Preclous Legacy: Vaughan Williams and Essex Folksong' (Sue Cubbin, Essex Record Office), Vaughan Williams in Cambridgeshire. Deciphering the Manuscripts' (Mary Humphreys, singer & researcher) and Vaughan Williams: Then and Now: Collecting and Communities in Norfolk & Sulfolk (Katle Howson, East Anglian Traditional Music Trust). There will also be a unique chance to see several exhibitions linked to the talks. Tickets are available for the whole day or for the concert only. The concert features a selection of the folk songs collected by Vaughan Williams in the eastern counties, brought back to life by singers Chris Coe, Mary Humphreys and Anahata, Adrian May, Sue Cubbin and Elaine Barker.

The event takes place in Waterweck Village Hild. Waterweck is off the A12 year Bijthhorgh in Softok, and across the Fivor Flight hom Smithwesk. Doors open to view the certifichters at 10.30 km and take start at 11km. There will be a bruge by lands and an interval for tea before the content, which have from April 5-15.1 km refront marks to a available, or forch may be booked at local public houses. Further details will be sent out by exall post on receipt of payment.



J.W. Georges drew this from memory in 1930, and he is the man on the right, with the pipe.





wards James Stannard came into the yard, and Mrs. Newman's children complained to him that Bailey would not let them play, and Stannard said he would not have his brothers and aisters struck while his mother was out. Mrs. Bailey thereupon said, "Who cares for you?" and used bad language. He (deceased) said if Bailey's people wanted anything they were to come out. The Baileys then got round him, and Bailey's daughter (Elizabeth Maul), who had a baby in her arms, struck him on the head with a baby's shoe, and then five of them—William Bailey and his wife, Mrs. Maul, Lol Bailey, and Naomi Bailey, all set about him, striking him about the head and face with their fists. They beat him until his nose and his teeth were bleeding. Then Mary Ann Panton came into the yard, and pulled him away from them into his house, the door of which she locked.




Henry Flanders' song book




King's Lynn

Henry Flanders (1842-1890) was a fisherman and fish dealer from the North End of King's Lynn.


His book of song lyrics has been passed down through his family.


The words to *The Hairin Scarin Fisherman* carved on a stone. (Loke Road recreation ground, North Lynn)

The significant differences are:

- · the huge amount of sentimental songs in the Flanders songbook
- · the complete lack of comic songs in Vaughan Williams' collection
- the complete lack of romantic songs recorded mid 20th century


The themes of the sea and <u>heroicism</u> are found in all periods.
